

We are a community coworking and creative events space based in Edinburgh. To be more precise, we are based in the community of Portobello, Edinburgh's seaside. We are a collection of social entrepreneurs, freelancers, charities, SMEs and now more than ever, employees. From photographers to translators, graphic designers to environmental consultants, we have over 145 members and provide offices, studios, permanent desks and hot desking.

Tribe is big on building community and believes that a nurturing environment which sparks creativity and collaboration is good for business, individuals and communities. At Tribe, you will also find a strong community of female run enterprises through our partner, Keystone, as well as a home for circular economy champions like The Edinburgh Tool Library and Velow Bikeworks. Tribe is also big on health and wellbeing and have Portobello Natural Health and The Pilates Studio Edinburgh. To make sure we support the creative sector and business wellbeing, we are home to Oi Musica, GLOcast Sodak and more. Tribe Porty is proudly a social enterprise.













COWORKING STATISTICS



COWORKER NUMBERS OVER 5 YEARS





2023 saw another fantastic jump in the number of coworkers using Tribe.

Whilst we have a wide variety of workers at Tribe, Arts, Culture and Entertainment remains our largest demographic. In comparison to last year, the fields of work coworkers are based in remained largely the same.

As seen in last year's coworking figures, the rise in employed users since the pandemic has remained and makes up over 50% of our demographic.






We have also noticed another increase in coworkers working for charities and community interest companies.

While coworkers are central, the impact of Velow Bikeworks stands out—going beyond providing a space for bike enthusiasts to offering sales, servicing, and real-time assistance, showcasing the versatility and interconnectedness of our space. 




After collecting four years of coworking data, our team examined the monthly usage of the building. Based on the graph, March, September, and November were our busiest periods, while April and July were consistently slower months. To address these declines in the coming year, we plan to boost our promotional offers on day passes and expand our range of partner share packages.

Our highest recorded month was March 2023, where we had a whopping **686** monthly users.

TOTAL NUMBER OF COWORKERS PER MONTH






BARRIERS TO COWORKING

This year also saw a new initiative called, Bring Your Own Buddy. Over the months of July and August we encouraged our members to invite a colleague, friend or partner to join us for a free day of coworking. This was not only to thank our members for being a part of our Tribe but to help us share, connect and grow as a community.

We welcomed some new members through our partnership with Creative Informatics. The Creative Informatics Inclusive Innovation Working Spaces Fund is a strand of support providing professional working space for diverse and under-represented creative entrepreneurs and start ups in a number of partner organisations across the city region.

DAY PASSES

We are not a members only club. We strive to actively encourage diversity and understand that a reccuring membership is not for everyone. As well as our standard day pass options, this year we launched off peak passes. This allows half day access on select days.



In April 2023, we launched our off peak pass to increase users during our quietest days, these were Mondays & Fridays. We've noticed that our off-peak passes have largely been used by those with children and may not have a full day available. It's been great to see that the addition of the off peak pass has been useful to working parents.

Many coworkers frequently used the off peak pass simply to shake up their day and use it as a change of scenery from working from homea welcome break from isolation.

WHY I USE AN OFF PEAK PASS

"I'm a freelance musician. I conduct youth and community choirs and work for various music organisations developing their community engagement. I'm also a mum of two and I need somewhere to do my admin and prep that isn't a corner of a table strewn with dishes and toys. I try to use Tribe one morning a week with the hope of coming more often once my little one turns one and I start to pick up more work."

"I had visited Tribe a couple of times for events but hadn't ever used it as a working space. I use the occasional off peak pass to have a morning to focus on some writing in a space free of the usual distractions of home."

"I had been working from home for a year and honestly just needed a change of scenery and a reason to get out of the house during the day. Tribe looked nice and I wanted to test it out before committing to a membership. Off peak passes worked great for me whilst self employed, after accepting a full time remote job I signed up for an unlimited package."



COMMUNITY SNAPSHOTS

In addition to our coworking community, we are home to eight businesses at Tribe. We would like to take this opportunity to touch base with Sodak and Glocast and see what the past year has had in store for them.

SODAK

Sodak is a behavioural design agency with a close-knit team of three core members, bolstered by a network of specialists when the need arises. We've carved out our niche in the UK. with occasional forays into the US market. Our mission is to To help people understand people. To help improve the moral and ethical performance, efficiency, and effectiveness of organisations by improving management and responsible leadership through behavioural insights. We aim to help create nurturing environments that improve the safety, health, and wellbeing, of those at-risk, who work in high-risk industries.

2023 AT SODAK

We're particularly active in the construction industry, where we focus on helping our clients drive improvements in health, safety, and quality, alongside fostering enhanced leadership skills. Since our start in 2013, we've seen steady growth, and 2023 marked our most successful year yet with a 42% increase in turnover.

In 2023, we have worked with 20 Businesses and 30 individuals. From the individual buyers of conversation cards to Hinkley Point C Nuclear Power Station with 10,000 on site workers. In that time we have trained 205 leaders and trained 36 of those as trainers. These trainers have in turn trained over a thousand supervisors and workers in behavioural science. Our Conversation Cards to reduce risk and improve performance have initiated almost a quarter of a million conversations.

Our portfolio of clients is quite diverse in size, more than industry. From a £35 box of conversation cards to creating the Behavioural Improvement Programme for one of the largest most complex projects in Europe, Hinkley Point C Nuclear Power Station. However, one of the best collaborations we have on going at present is with a company that work predominantly in the rail sector. We've been working with AmcoGiffen since 2021 where we took their Executive team through an online (due to the pandemic) version of our main behavioural science for leader's course. We developed a specific behavioural improvement programme for them, which they have rolled out to their offices and sites across the UK. As a result, they have significantly reduced the number of injuries and incidents over the last 2 years, improved client relationships and won a number of industry awards for their efforts.









COMMUNITY SNAPSHOTS

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GLOCAST

Here at GLO, we are a conference video, live streaming and hybrid event production company. It is our goal to support our clients in creating engaging and exciting video content for their company and support any live stream or hybrid events either in-person or online to engage with their audiences worldwide, and help deliver successful events.



This year we worked in 10 cities across the UK and internationally our team went to Davos, Prague, Cannes, Vienna, and Dubai. With our online events, we reach and engage audiences across the world, including places like Australia, Asia, the United States, and more!

2023 AT GLOCAST

We have worked with over 60 clients this year on over 200 events. As always, we appreciate each and every one of our clients for their support, and it's been fun to work with some new clients this year, and we look forward to creating new relationships in 2024. Next year we will be heading to Texas, and we're currently pitching for some new opportunities in California, Milan, and new companies to support in Davos, and Cannes.

Our stand-out filming projects usually revolve around our international events, which involve extensive filming and quick-turn-around edits. At the event in Prague this year, our team of four handled all event highlight videos, social media videos, and podcast videos. Filming included event sessions, broll, drone footage, interviews, vox-pops, and creating a mobile podcast studio as part of an on-trend, podcast-style interview. For the closing show, we delivered a highlight video of the event, several social reels, and lots of interviews and podcasts to be used for future marketing initiatives.

We also collaborated with Vive Events this year to provide live streaming, and hybrid support at the world leading medical symposium in London. This is a fully hybrid event, with every session live streamed, including remote presenters. The hybrid nature was to extend a live streamed surgery via a specialist two-way link to a hospital in Germany.

The program consisted of back-to-back sessions from 8am until 6pm across the three auditoriums for three days. With this number of presenters, and such a tight schedule, there was no room for error, and had to run with military precision. The live stream was watched in over 50 countries and allowed viewers to submit questions straight to the top table at the event!












EVENTS AT TRIBE

In 2023, we took 111 event bookings with November being our busiest month. We have secured four new clients as recurring bookings. We love our recurring bookings like the writing retreats from Writers HQ. We also host the Green Party, Porty Pride and Portobello Running Club for their meetings. It was great to see the space used in such a diverse way, non-recurring bookings ranged from workshops to baby showers and was even used as a film set.

As we no longer have The White Hall space it is impossible for us to reach the same level of bookings as seen in 2019. It is fantastic to see a steady rise in our bookings and the past year has encouraged our team to think differently about how the space can be used.

If you want to host a workshop or event, we would be happy to accommodate you. We love a good partnership and bringing people together.























TRIBE TALKS



Tribe Talks are a monthly event hosted by a member of the Tribe Porty community. Tribe Talks are always free to attend and all are welcome. Tribe Talks are such an important way for us to connect to the wider community, share stories and form new connections.



The past year has seen us host seven Tribe Talks from both members and friends of Tribe. We have hosted talks of all kinds. For example, we celebrated a book launch from member James Robertson, a talk about self care during menopause from member and Portobello Natural Health practitioner Hannah Swift and a photography workshop from member Jo Tennant.



As well as talks from our members this year saw us extend the invitation to host friends of Tribe. Rise of Happiness originally reached out to Tribe to hold copies of their free wellbeing magazine. Co-founders Rob and Kaigan deliver wellbeing talks internationally and speak openly about their own mental health and wellbeing journeys. The duo hosted an evening on the importance of choosing happiness in our lives and how you can create your path to happiness.

POETRY EVENINGS

This year also saw us think a bit differently about what a Tribe Talk could be. In the lead up to International Women's day we thought about how we could encourage an open dialogue about what IWD means to our members and how we can use the talk to cultivate open conversations. We decided that poetry could provide the perfect icebreaker. We reached out to friend and Keystone alumni Laura Westring.

Laura writes her own poetry which is published on her instagram account, poems for almost lovers. Laura mentioned a few times over the course of the evening that she does not necessarily see herself as a poet but was delighted to be referred to as one for the first time during introductions. Laura's speech took us on a journey through a short poetic journey of love and the feminine from Ur to Sterling.

"As long as there has been the written word, there have been women writing, but, somewhere along the way, we began to value their writing less. We forgot the roles women have played in guiding our understanding of the universe and our connection to the divine.

In my collection Poems for almost lovers, published on instagram for the sheer pleasure I gain from adding to it, I explore what it means to lose and grieve for love as well as how it feels to find even greater loves.

Female love and desire can and should be unapologetically, exquisitely carnal, yes, for therein lies the very font of all creation, but our desires to be heard, to learn, to achieve and to better ourselves are often equally suppressed."

INTERNATIONAL WOMENS DAY & PORTY PRIDE

Alongside Laura, we were joined by five talented poets. Their vulnerable and beautiful work inspired honest and thoughtful conversations about motherhood, vulnerability, friendship, and the ability to rate oneself despite others' opinions. The event was such a success that we decided to host another evening of poetry to celebrate Porty Pride.

Something we have come to love about hosting poetry evenings is that it allows people to publicly share and recite their work for the first time, it is wonderful to give that opportunity. During the Porty Pride evening, a member of our audience was on a trip from their hometown in Canada. They stumbled upon our event on eventbrite whilst looking for something 'local and queer' to take part in. Before reading their work, they mentioned that if they had not found our event they would not have visited Portobello. Whilst in Portobello they said they noticed all of the Pride flags in shop windows and felt like Porty was a little haven. This really solidified the importance of hosting evenings such as this.



2023 launched our first community summer party post pandemic. We decided to use our summer party as a way to help raise money for a local lad and friend of Tribe, Jay.

Jay is a happy, brave and loving young man with a wicked sense of humour. Jay was born with Cerebral Palsy which significantly affects his mobility and communication. Jay's a wheelchair user, unable to stand or walk and limited motor function and high muscle tone means it's really hard for him to exercise or participate in physical activities.

As he gets older it's getting harder and harder for Jay to stay fit and strong. His motor function and the weight of his wheelchair means his ability to push himself around is very limited and there are very few exercise options open to him. We used the party to help fundraise for Jay to have his own Innowalk.

"The summer fair at Tribe was a fantastic afternoon. The local community and Jay's friends came along and had the chance to sample artwork, jewellery and wellbeing experiences from Tribe's members as well as great food and an awesome performance from Oi Musica! Jay thoroughly enjoyed himself and it was so special for us as a family to feel the support of our local community.

The silent auction was a great success with the funds raised from the day making a significant addition to Jay's fundraiser. As a result we're now confident that we'll be able to get Jay his Innowalk by the Autumn. A massive thank you to Tribe Porty."

Taking the time to interview each person has served as a valuable reminder of the importance of connection and conversation.



DANI REFLECTS: "EACH PERSON BROUGHT THEIR UNIQUE STORY TO THE CONVERSATION, A BIT OF WHERE THEY HAVE COME FROM IN TERMS OF SIGNIFICANT LIFE MOMENTS WHICH HAVE IMPACTED ON WHAT THEY ARE DOING TODAY. THINKING BACK, IT WAS OFTEN A PERSON OR AN INTERACTION WHICH PROFOUNDLY IMPACTED A DECISION OR DIRECTION. SOMETIMES ONLY WITH HINDSIGHT DO YOU NOTICE SUCH INFLUENCES."

Upon reflection of season one, it's striking how many guests expressed the significance of community support and encountering the right people at crucial junctures in their work journeys. Trust emerges as the anchor, intertwining with the courage to place taking risks.

Another overarching theme is around trust -a mix between trusting oneself and extending that trust to others. This narrative seemlessly weaves into the heart of coworking, where Tribe transcends the conventional definition of a workspace.

It's a sacred space (and I don't say that lightly) where connections flourish over lunch, tea breaks, and heartfelt conversations. We all have a profound human yearning for community and connection.
